Simple Observations on Project Management

Our November meeting is a joint meeting with the Nashville Chapter of the Project Management Institute. The meeting will be held at our usual AITP time (5:30 pm – Thursday, November 8th) and place (Holiday Inn-Vanderbilt).

Our program is presented by Walter "Bubba" Mullen, who has over 22 years of IT experience. Bubba will talk about what to do right and what not to do on IT projects. He calls these stories "Simple Observations" and expressed them in an article published in Midrange Computing. Bubba is also working on a book along the same lines.

A few of the project management topics will include:

- + Roller coaster safety

He became VP/CIO of Direct Insurance for three years, then moved to IBM for three years managing the image and workforce practice for Tennessee and the Carolinas for IBM Global Services.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Fellow Members and Guests,

Nick Holland, CentreSource, was our guest speaker at the October AITP meeting and his topic was "Open Source Explained". Wow, did we get some "explaining" or what?

Nick really opened my mind to open source! I guess I had the same misconceptions about open source that a lot of people seem to have. I hear the term "open source" and I think of free software that's immature and of poor quality, and that's also unsupportable. A lot of people also associate open source with hackers.

I had never heard, or even dreamed, of the more altruistic aspects of open source! Nick shared many facts about open source with us. Contrary to popular belief, open source is not really free – it's collaborative. Open source is a collaboration of ideas with input from many different people. People who have an innate desire to make a difference in this world – a good difference!

Open source starts when someone gets a cool idea. They mention it to other people who also think it's a cool idea. All of these people then get together to implement this cool idea in an attempt to change the world! Pretty neat concept! It's a "birds of a feather" or an "ant power" or a "two heads are better than one" kind of thing! One of the better known examples of this is the SETI (Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence) program. You may have heard of this project where individual computer owners can volunteer some of their desktop PC processing in the search for extraterrestrial life. Another recent example is the "one laptop per child" project that was started about four years ago. The goal was to build laptops for \$100 or less to enable more children around the world to have access to the Internet and e-mail. A prototype has successfully been built for \$100; this prototype is running Linux, which is open source. Look to hear more about this project!

Nick listed several of the more popular open source applications available today. Among them are Linux, Apache, Eclipse IDE, SugarCRM, Firefox, Thunderbird, Open Office, Pidgim, Wikipedia, and Clam AV. Nick's company is actually using Open Office. He said that it's not all roses but sometimes it's more about economics! There is a cost to switch to open products – there's retraining, issues with support, lack of features and/or focus, instability, and licensing (there are 31 different flavors of open source licensing). You just have to consider the value between features and cost. Sometimes you also have to consider the long-term costs.

There's a perception with a lot of companies that open source products just aren't good enough. Nick sited several statistics that prove otherwise. Thirty-three universities in Germany use Linux (over 560,000 students). Venezuela recently passed a law saying that all public agencies there must use open source applications by 2008. Starbucks, Honeywell, and NASA all use SugarCRM. A study conducted in 2002 stated that 64% of Japanese companies use Linux.

Open source code is actually at the heart of many applications available on the market today. Just to name a few, Linux, MAC O/S X 10.5, Firefox, Beowulf, Gmail, Yahoo, Google, and Alfresco all use open source code.

As open source becomes more popular, support is also becoming more available. Some of the big guns are now supporting open source code. Dell, HP, Lenova (Thinkpad), IBM, Sun (JAVA), Novell, Yahoo (uses MySQL), and Google (written in Python) are all good examples of big companies supporting open source software.

And, as always, I like to somehow make analogies from the presentation that relate back to AITP. I can make several from October's presentation. Just like open source, AITP is also collaborative and a way cool idea! AITP also supports those "birds of a feather", "ant power", and "two heads are better than one" philosophies. My personal favorite is "the more the merrier"! So, come collaborate with us at our November 8th meeting!

NEW MEMBER PROFILE

Colonel Herb Grogan

This Section of the Nashville Chapter Newsletter normally is to spotlight Chapter members, especially new members.

We recently welcomed Herb Grogan, a former AITP member, who had retired after more than 30 years of military service in the U.S. Army. He said he was back for good and eager to be active in AITP again. After a month at home, and after we had pulled this information together, Herb told us that they wanted him back on active duty for another year. He has reported to the U.S. Army War College in Carlisle Barracks, PA, where he will teach in the areas of counterinsurgency. We decided to go ahead with this article, even though it is not in our typical New Member Profile format.

Herb Grogan works for American General as a Project Coordinator when not on active military duty. Herb came to Nashville from Jacksonville, Florida, where he was working in the computer area for the Independent Life Insurance Company. American General purchased Independent Life in 1997, and Herb and his family relocated to Nashville after more than 13 years in Jacksonville.



Herb and his wife Paula were both raised in Massachusetts. Herb attended Worcester State College in Worchester, MA, where he earned a BS in Natural Science and a M.Ed. in Computer Science. They have three children and four grandchildren split between Spring Hill and Massachusetts. Paula is an elementary school teacher in Spring Hill.

Herb was called to active military duty in 1999 to manage the Army Reserve Y2K project. He also spent a year in Bosnia commanding a battalion and dealing with 32 other nations at NATO HQ in Sarajevo. Herb returned in 2001 to American General and to AITP for a few months until September 11th happened. This resulted in another active duty call to the Pentagon and to Baghdad as an Information Operations Officer. Herb was then back at American General in late 2003.

He was again recalled and was in Colorado as the War Plans Chief for the Army Strategic Command, and then to Alabama as the Deputy Director of the Future War-

fare Center at the Redstone Arsenal. During 2005 and 2006, Herb was back in Iraq as the Senior Advisor to the Iraqi Joint Staff for Training and Force Generation. After that, he spent a year at the U.S. Army War College. He came home and "retired" in 2007. After a month, he was back on active duty.

Herb says that his life goals, after this "last" tour, are to start a business in Spring Hill that is meaningful to the community. He continues to do market research to determine that cutting edge service that is not yet available to young families.

We wish Herb and his family the best of luck and a safe return to the Nashville area. When he left us in 1999, he had been a member of the AITP Board for several years, and had been elected Vice President. We would like him to complete his "tours of duty" with the AITP Nashville Chapter.


