Computer Game Development

Our November program is about computer games. Many of you play computer games, and there have been requests to have an AITP program on developing games.

Our speaker is Tyson Tune who is the Director of Technology and Development at Good Touch Software. He manages iPhone application planning, process and development for mobile applications centered on casual gaming, hobbies, and entertainment.

Tyson will discuss:

- What are computer games?
- Who develops them?
- How are they marketed?
- How long do they take to complete?
- Who are the developers?
- What should you know to develop?
- What tricks/tips are there in developing games?

In addition to his Good Touch Software work, Tyson is also a Flash Developer for MTV Networks. He integrates and develops all Flash applications, games and services for CMT.com. He supports other Flash Developers at MTV Networks brands MTV, VH1 and Logo. MTV Networks is a division of Viacom International, Inc.

and owns and operates six cable television programming networks, including CMT, which is headquartered in Nashville. Tyson has a third job of managing the Tune Design Group which does copy editing and design for websites. They also produce enterprise level web applications for large and small businesses.



Tyson was an Instructor at High-Tech Institute – Nashville for several years. He taught, among others, courses in Video Production and Editing, Graphic Design, Flash Animation and Programming, and 3D Animation. Tyson also served as the Faculty Advisor to the AITP Student Chapter at High-Tech Institute.

Tyson holds a B.A. degree in Communications from Emerson College in Boston, MA. Tyson is a native of Nashville, even graduated from Montgomery Bell Academy, but wanted to go away to college. He came back to Nashville, however, since people in Boston talked “funny.”

Tyson is married and lives in the Green Hills area. He enjoys playing video games and watching sports. Vacations are often to Singapore since his wife is from there.

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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

In Orwell's *1984*, the government knows all and sees all. It pervades every aspect of people's lives, knowing where they go, what they do, how they spend their money, even what they think. It accomplishes this through comprehensive, 24-hour surveillance. Almost 25 years after the setting of the book and almost 50 years after being published, the technology is available to achieve such scrutiny in our daily lives. Much of this technology involves cameras, but the enabler to such invasive monitoring is radio frequency identification, or RFID, for short. Paul Reed and Hugh Kirkpatrick of Business Resources Solutions (BRS) discussed these possibilities with AITP in October. But that's not what they came to discuss. As with any tool or technology, it's what's done with it that is the difference. Mr. Reed and Mr. Kirkpatrick effectively made that point. They came to talk about the myriad of possibilities RFID gives our society to be safer, more secure, more productive; they also discussed how the characteristics of RFID help to realize those gains.

On the safety front, Mr. Kirkpatrick talked about pro football teams monitoring players' core temperatures to ensure they don't overheat. Players swallow small capsules containing sensors and RFID technology which transmits sensor readings allowing team doctors to manage a player's core temperature. These types of capsules can be similarly used by patients for certain medical examinations, thus avoiding more invasive, uncomfortable methods. Security, as well as safety, can be enhanced in hospitals by using RFID to track patients, especially infants, children, and those with dementia. Mr. Reed discussed the many and varied applications that will make us more productive such as supply chain operations, asset tracking, and manufacturing. Wal-Mart, in particular, sees the value of RFID and is committed to making it a core part of its supply chain including mandating RFID use by suppliers. The implementation has gone more slowly than planned, but has shown definite promise, for example reducing out-of-stocks by 8% worldwide. Beyond these instances briefly mentioned, there are applications in animal husbandry, postal shipping, building access, vending machines, and much, much more.

Mr. Reed and Mr. Kirkpatrick explained some of the characteristics that make RFID appropriate in so many situations. One of the most important is that RFID is not line-of-sight technology. RFID chips and antennae can be hidden for aesthetic purposes or imbedded for medical uses such as those mentioned above. Depending on the size and power of the transmitter, the receiver can be anywhere from a few inches up to several hundred feet away. Another critical characteristic is the batch capability. Imagine a shopping cart full of products each with a unique RFID signature. The contents could be identified and priced almost instantaneously without the need for scanning individual items. This certainly can lead to vast productivity gains. Finally, the secure encryption for transmission and reception is not easily counterfeited, facilitating a whole host of applications where security is a must.

As you may be beginning to realize, RFID applications are almost limitless, but are not always appropriate. Business Resources Solutions can help you determine if RFID will fit your need. But even in *1984*, you wouldn't need RFID to know that AITP Nashville is *where IT professionals meet*.

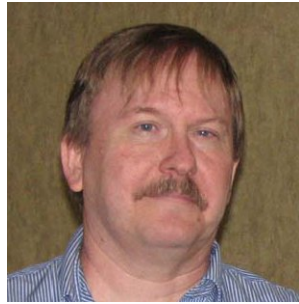

FALL 2008 PROFESSIONAL MEMBERSHIP PROMOTION - AITP Member Message

AITP Member Communication:

In June 2008, the Membership Committee approved the following plan for its 2008 Fall Promotion. This recruitment promotion will be the largest and most comprehensive one AITP has conducted. The promotion will run from October 1 through December 31, 2008. It features three components:
