## SHARE POINT APPLICATIONS

Our August program is a discussion of Microsoft's SharePoint Products and Technologies. SharePoint is a content management system which provides seamless document collaboration and information sharing. It is web-based and provides a central point of access for people and teams.

Our speaker is Matthew Wilson who is a Programmer/Analyst and Web Developer with the Compuware Corporation located in Brentwood, TN. Matt has more than eight years experience working in the SharePoint areas.

Matt will give us an overview of SharePoint Products and Technologies and the features of Windows SharePoint Services and SharePoint Portal Server. He will also discuss the customization of SharePoint and give us several real-world applications using SharePoint.



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In addition to his SharePoint Technologies work, Matt has expertise in a number of areas including ASP Net, C++, JavaScript, SQL Server, Visual Basic. NET, and XML. Matt's industry experience is spread across Insurance, Transportation, and Health Care.

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## MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

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For the first time since I started at MTSU, employers are starting to hire. When I arrived in 2002, I felt pretty bad for our graduating seniors because I did not know where they could get a job. Now I feel confident that if they pursue an equitable job opportunity, they will find a job that matches their skills. Our speaker for the July meeting spoke of some of the same situations.

Lizamari Suria, from Robert Half Technology, gave a very informative talk about IT salary trends. She also gave insight into where she sees the hiring environment for IT and the current state of the Nashville market. According to her experiences, high level people in IT are looking to move and are receiving multiple offers. Organizations have waited so long to hire that they first need help at the upper levels of management and then after that has been filled, they will look to hire at the lower level positions. Entry level has not had much luck until now, which is evident to me based on the recent inquiries into our students by employers.

In the past year salaries have risen 3.86% with IT auditors receiving the highest pay raise of 11.2%. Second was lead applications developers (5.3%), followed by network security administrators (5.2%), business systems analysts (5.1%), and data analyst/report writers (5.0%). Therefore, it can be assumed that these areas are also having troubles finding good people since normally salaries are driven up when there is a lack of potential employees.

It was also interesting to hear about what is driving the current hiring in IT. According to Robert Half's research the following are drivers of the new employment hiring:

- Network security
- Development of web applications
- Business intelligence
- Wireless communication
- Regulatory requirements (auditing)

We look forward to seeing you at our next meeting.

### History of AITP

The year was 1951. Harry S. Truman was President of the United States. A 3 bedroom home cost \$9,000.00. A new Ford listed for \$1,480.00; postage was \$.03; and a loaf of bread cost \$.16. Joe DiMaggio retired from baseball; *I Love Lucy* premiered; and peace talks began in Korea.

In Chicago, a group of machine accountants got together and decided that the future was only beginning for the TAB machines they were operating. They were members of a local group called the Machine Accountants Association (MAA). The technology was new; something few people understood and managing this new technology was a skill that even fewer people possessed. The machine accountants recognized the need to form a professional support group, a national association, to address the growing issues of this new technology. Thus on December 26, 1951, after a constitutional convention was held in Chicago, the State of Illinois granted a charter and the National Machine Accountants Association (NMAA) was founded.

Groups from Houston, Columbus, Wabash Valley, the Twin Cities, Penn-Del, and 22 others were the first to join NMAA. Robert L. Jenal, systems manager for Toni Company, was elected the first International President at the 1952 First Annual Convention in Minneapolis.

In 1960, the association sponsored a meeting of educators and businessmen with the purpose of establishing the Certificate in Data Processing (CDP) professional examination program. The first CDP exam was held in 1962 in New York. 1962 was also the year that the association leaders recognized the changing nature of information processing techniques brought about by the introduction of the computer. Thus, the members decided in 1962 to adopt a more progressive name, the Data Processing Management Association (DPMA), to reflect the changing industry.

Always striving to promote the continued education of the members, the leadership of DPMA created the Registered Business Programmer (RBP) examination in 1970. Both the CDP and the RBP exams were given annually under the rules established by the Certification Council, at test centers in colleges and universities across North America. Eventually, DPMA decided to help establish the [Institute for the Certification of Computer Professionals \(ICCP\)](#) to stimulate more widespread interest and industry acceptance of the examinations. ICCP began administering the CDP program in early 1974.

The association has always acknowledged the contributions of prominent professionals within the Information Technology field. Beginning in 1969 with the creation of the annual *Computer Sciences Man-of-the-Year Award* for outstanding contributions to the information processing industry, DPMA has established a long-standing tradition of honoring IT professionals from every aspect of the industry. This prestigious award was renamed the *Distinguished Information Sciences Award* in 1980 and is awarded every year at the Annual Meeting of the Members.

As the industry has evolved, so has the association. Starting as the NMAA, evolving into the DPMA, and then into our current evolution in 1996 of the ASSOCIATION of INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PROFESSIONALS (AITP), the association has kept pace with the changing needs and interests of our members. AITP members span every level of the IT industry from mainframe systems, to micro systems, to PC based LAN and WAN systems, to virtual systems and the internet. AITP has special niches created that cater to the [special interests](#) of our members. Our members are found in every facet of society as well. They're in colleges and universities; banking; industry; retail; the armed forces; local, state and federal governments; hospitals; etc.

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## MONTHLY WORDS OF WISDOM - Test for Systems Analysts

**BIOLOGY:** Create life. Estimate the differences in subsequent human culture if this form of life had developed 500 million years earlier, with special attention to its probable effect on the English Parliamentary System. Prove your thesis.

**MUSIC:** Write a piano concerto. Orchestrate and perform it with flute and drum. You will find a piano under your seat.

**PSYCHOLOGY:** Based on your knowledge of their works, evaluate the emotional stability, degree of adjustment, and repressed frustrations of each of the following: Alexander of Aphrodisias, Rameses II, Gregory of Nica, Hammurabi. Support your evaluation with quotations from each man's work, making appropriate references. It is not necessary to translate into English.

**SOCIOLOGY:** Estimate the sociological problems which might accompany the end of the world. Construct an experiment to test your theory.

**ENGINEERING:** The disassembled parts of a high-powered rifle have been placed on your desk. You will also find an instructional manual, printed in Swahili. In ten minutes a hungry Bengal Tiger will be admitted into the room. Take whatever action you feel appropriate. Be prepared to justify your decision.

**ECONOMICS:** Develop a realistic plan for refinancing the national debt. Trace the possible effects of your plan in the following areas: Cubism, the Donatist Controversy, the Wave Theory of Light. Outline a method for preventing these effects. Criticize this method from all possible points of view. Point out the deficiencies in your point of view as demonstrated in your answer to the last question.

**POLITICAL SCIENCE:** There is a red telephone on the desk beside you. Start World War III. Report at length on its socio-political effects, if any.

**EPISTEMOLOGY:** Take a position for or against truth. Prove the validity of your stand.

**PHYSICS:** Explain the nature of matter. Include in your answer an evaluation of the impact of the development of mathematics on science.

**PHILOSOPHY:** Sketch the development of human thought, estimate its significance. Compare with the development of any other kind of thought.

**GENERAL KNOWLEDGE:** Describe in detail. Be objective and specific.
